

Council absence

THE rock art meeting called by the National Trust at Lotteries House to save the rock art on the Burrup Peninsula was packed out.

To be a minion of the giant resource companies and the State Government or to be a champion of shire rights and obligations?

Unless the present shire councillors get their act together, they are NOT representing the best interests or the residents and they should be sacked.
